the best stage in life to mould a positive and conscious individual.


To inculcate compassionate values in our children, we invite your institution to participate in a painting competition with the theme: "Where is our food coming from?"

Pachyderms Rescued!

Coming to the rescue of a pair of chained elephants at Indore Zoo, a Lokadalat of Madhya Pradesh High Court in Indore on Saturday directed the state government to trans-locate and set free within 45 days these pachyderms either in world famous Kanha Tiger Reserve or Bandhavgarh National Park - both situated in eastern part of the state.

The authorities were asked to submit their compliance report regarding male elephant named 'Moti' and female pachyderm christened 'Champa' within 45 days.



The elephants were captive for more than ten years at the Indore zoo. During the hearing, Central Zoo Authority (CZA) counsel Mohan Sausarkar stated the retention of elephants at Indore zoo is unjust and improper. The CZA has already issued circular prohibiting keeping the elephants captive in zoos on November 7, 2009, the counsel said.

The HC direction came while disposing of a Public Interest Litigation moved by Dr. Sudhir Khetawat, Chairman of Indore, Madhya Pradesh Branch of Karuna International for rehabilitation of the two captive elephants.





Being Vegetarian

What does it mean to be a vegetarian? It seems to mean many different things to different people. Certainly the idea of being vegetarian in India is very different to being a vegetarian in the United States or Argentina, traditional meat eating countries where meat is not only the main focus of a meal but is also almost synonymous with food. People in these and other western countries, until quite recently, have thought of vegetarians as rare and unnatural- either as health freaks, animal rights activists or eco terrorists wanting to convert the world.



home of a vegetarianism that goes back thousands of years. There are more vegetarians in this country than anywhere else. So it does seem to be strange to discuss being vegetarian in an Indian magazine because most Indians are very comfortable with the idea of vegetarianism even if they themselves are meat eaters. Everybody knows someone who is vegetarian, and in fact, even most non-vegetarians may have a predominantly vegetarian diet. Most Indians wear their vegetarianism as naturally as their skin. It is just part of their family background, part of their cultural identity. The environment encourages and supports them too-and the cuisine reflects that.

Where else can one find such a wide variety of absolutely delicious vegetarian food? Indian menus are a cornucopia of, not just an incredible range of vegetables but also grains and pluses that are cooked up in myriad different ways in various regions of the vast Indian subcontinent. Dishes that don't just make your mouth water but also meet most of the required nutritional needs. Most Indians are lacto vegetarians; that is they are happy to inculcate dairy products in their diet though many consider egg

as a non vegetarian food.

For Vegetarians in most other parts of the world, being vegetarian isn't usually a cultural or religious identity supported by their society but a conscious personal choice they have made. And it often makes life more convenient because mainstream culture is so 'Carnivorous'! People make the choice to be vegetarian because they feel it is healthier, more ethical or a more responsible way to treat the planet's resources. So to some, being vegetarian is simply about the food they eat and staying healthy. To others it is way of life that reflects their relationship to the world around them.

Someone who is vegan, for example, is very particular about not using any animal products as they consider this exploiting that animal. This would include dairy food, as well as honey, wool and leather.

One of the concepts behind Indian Vegetarianism is that of Ahimsa or non violence that goes back thousands of years. This is an ideal that major Indian religious are closely associated with. Ahimsa clearly is about a lot more than food. It is attitude of respect to life.

Animals & Emotions

Believers, however, typically opine that animals are capable of a range of emotions, such as happiness, sadness, empathy, grief, curiosity, anger, anxiety and fear. Elephants, along with sea lions, geese, bears, monkeys and moose all appear to be hit hard by the death of a loved one. On a more cheerful note, dolphins, chimpanzees, elk and rats are among the multitude of mammals and smattering of birds that engage in play, appearing blissfully happy when they do.



Some 15 days back, I witnessed a scene in front of my house which shows the love and affection of the canines, dogs.

I had seen a mother and her puppy in that area for the past few days. One morning the duo looked sad, may be they were hungry and had nothing to eat! I brought one idly and put it near the mother dog since the puppy had gone away from that place. To my surprise, I noticed, that the mother dog did not eat the food immediately but caught it in the mouth and ran away to her puppy and dropped the food near it. The mother dog watched as her puppy swallowed the food happily.
